*“Let the Devil Take the West, It Is Only Important What We Are Talking About“.
The last journey of Josip Broz Tito to Moscow (May 17–18, 1979)*

Summary

Josip Broz Tito visited the Soviet Union for the last time in 1979. This visit was a part of his diplomatic activity that he undertook in order to prepare the Sixt Summit of the Non-Aligned Movement. Tito and Brezhnev discussed about disagreements coming from different views on international relations, such as: writing of Yugoslav press, anti-Yugoslav campaign in the Soviet press, development of Yugoslav-Chinese relations, Yugoslav attitude towards events in Southeast Asia, Soviet support of Bulgarian territorial aspirations towards Macedonia, Soviet subversive activities inside one number of non-aligned countries in order to divide them in progressive and reactionary ones. The Soviet and the Yugoslav president also discussed global crises in the Middle East and Southern Africa, discussed about general topics such as: détente, disarmament and decolonization. Tito could have been satisfied with the outcome of his visit to Soviet Union, which was evaluated as useful. The dialogue of the Soviet and the Yugoslav leaders had enabled more peaceful period between two countries for some time and reaffirmed principles on which the bilateral relations could be developed in the future.
